pledge a renewed allegiance to God in exile.

To enter this suffering, Paul encourages Timothy to have faith in God and to entrust his life to God, as he has. Timothy is to trust the power of the Holy Spirit

In Luke, the disciples ask Jesus to increase their faith, and he reminds them what God can do with even the little faith they have.

Housing for Victims of Family Violence – JustAct 21/09/2025:

While nursing her four-month-old baby one evening on the south coast of NSW, 'Elsa' called a family violence refuge hotline. It was her only opportunity to do so, as her abusive partner was out of the house. She was told that there was a ten-year waiting list for accommodation. Luckily, she could briefly couch surf with trusted friends before applying for a low-quality rental property. "If that had not happened, I may have had to go back to him".

Domestic and family violence is a form of oppression that breaks the human spirit, preys on people in their vulnerability and attacks a person's most basic human values of trust, love, hope and self-worth. In Australia, family violence is the leading cause of homelessness for women. In Victoria, in 2022-2023, 54% of all women, young people and children who visited a Specialist Homelessness Service reported they had experienced family violence. A lack of housing for those fleeing family violence can force them to return to abusive and dangerous partners. Children, women, and young people in urgent need of housing as a result of family violence are waiting an average of 19.5 months to get into social housing. One in four survivors of family violence does not get even emergency accommodation.

There is an increasing use of motels as crisis accommodation for people fleeing family violence. This is a stop gap. Motels frequently lack cooking facilities and have nowhere for children to play and spend time outside their motel room. They fail to provide safety and stability in the longer term.

What You Can Do:

Write or e-mails the Federal Minister for Housing - Minister for Homelessness and/or the Assistant Minister for Women and the Prevention of Family Violence.

Express your concern at the lack of housing for people having to flee family violence and ask that the Australian Government fund the provision of 30,000 homes as social housing annually over the next 20 years.

Request that the Australian Government fund additional Special Family Violence Service staff so that these services can better assist people impacted by family violence to find safe and secure housing; and, double crisis accommodation places for people fleeing family violence to reduce (expensive) reliance on hotels.
