Christmas Bowl Advent 4

Our Christmas Bowl focus this week is Pakistan, particularly the region of Umerkot, where drought, poverty, and gender inequality have created enormous barriers for girls seeking an education.

Today we meet *Anaya* and her mother. For much of her life, the chance to attend school was out of reach for Anaya. Many girls in her village faced the same challenge, long distances, limited resources, and social expectations often kept them at home.

Through the Christmas Bowl and our local partner, Community World Service Asia, Anaya was able to enroll in a community-run school supported by the program. She received school supplies, a safe learning environment, and teachers who encouraged her dreams.

Now she hopes to become a doctor, not only for herself but for her community.

Her mother shared that once Anaya began attending school, other girls in the village followed her example. Her participation opened a door of possibility for others. Anaya's story reminds us that when girls are empowered to learn, entire communities are strengthened with hope, opportunity, and dignity.

This is the difference our support makes: opportunity, dignity, and the kind of love that transforms not just one life, but whole communities.

Minister's Christmas Message, December 2025

'Beyond the Cuteness of the Nativity'



Angels and shepherds, perhaps a donkey and a few sheep, some people dressed up as Mary and Joseph, and on rare occasions, a real live baby is placed in a feed stall. It is all rather cute, especially when children get involved and the cameras can go

into overdrive. We love a dramatic mish-mash telling of Matthew's and Luke's infancy narratives.

Each year I remember my daughter dressed as an angel, standing on a bench with several other kinder 'angels' when one child lost balance, and like dominos, one after another of the darling cherubs lost their balance and tilted sideways into the next 'angel' until they were all off balance and then off their bench. It all happened in slow motion, to much hilarity. Blessedly despite the bent haloes, no-one was injured.

For many people, Christmas has meaning because we gather as family and share traditions such as a roast turkey at Gran's or a family picnic in the botanic gardens. My sister and I used to have a pudding making day in the lead-up to Christmas, a time of fostering relationship and contributing toward the family Christmas Dinner event.

But without the centrality of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, our celebrations remain rather shallow, and we might puzzle over the point of the nativity and the exchange of gifts and the feasting. Especially when family relationships are strained or fractured or when beloved members are no longer with us. What then?

Christmas matters because we celebrate far more than an historical human birth in Palestine close to two thousand years ago. What we celebrate is most clearly articulated in John's Gospel, where there is no birth narrative at all! In the vulnerable baby boy child, born of a young Mary, the word (*logos*, meaning wisdom, discourse, reason, logic and more), the word became flesh and pitched tent among us. The Divine One, the light of life, lived among us and healed, preached, taught and confronted evil. And while initially it looked like evil had won out in the crucifixion of Jesus, ultimately, through the resurrection, the power of God's love defeated evil once and for all.

While it might seem that darkness is stirring violence and hatred in our world, we can take heart that God's love is a power beyond human capability and comprehension. John reminds us that darkness can never overtake the light of life that God infuses into all our lives.

In our Christmas celebrations this year, it is essential that we remember that the baby Jesus grew up and is remembered by various communities as the One sent by God, indeed, One with God, drawing people into closer relationship with God, and with one another in community together, seeking justice and righteousness for all. The enormity of this event has reverberated through history ever since. May the light of God's grace shine in whatever darkness we witness, and may our lives bear light and testimony to John's analysis, that the darkness did not and will not overtake it.

Congregation Annual Meeting


The Congregation annual meeting will be held following the service on Sunday 1 February and be followed by a shared lunch. All being well the annual report will be distributed prior to the day.
